

Translational Behavioral Medicine Example Implications Statements

Articles require an implications section, which states the paper's take-away for practice, policy, and research. Each implication should consist of one sentence, written as a pithy, action-oriented recommendation, rather than a description or summary. Please see the examples below.

Example 1

Implications

Practice: Capacity-building interventions need to be designed to effectively integrate diverse perspectives held by community-based practitioners and academics regarding the core skills required to implement evidence-based interventions.

Policy: Integrating the diverse perspectives of community-based practitioners and academics can help policymakers move beyond focusing on making a given evidence-based intervention “work” within harmful systems to initiating action to reshape these systems to center equity.

Research: These findings highlight likely gaps related to tailoring capacity-building implementation strategies for practitioners tackling health inequities.

Example 2

Implications

Practice: Using budget impact analysis (BIA) can help practitioners make key implementation decisions by providing information on the affordability of different implementation options, such as what tobacco use treatment services to deliver and what implementation strategies to use.

Policy: Funders and policy makers should encourage the inclusion of BIAs in economic evaluations of implementation efforts.

Research: Researchers should develop and conduct high-quality, user-friendly, and flexible BIAs alongside cost-effectiveness analyses to illuminate potential disconnects between context-specific affordability and overall value.
